Methodology

The data used in this report were collected by the Center for Rural Studies at the University of Vermont as part of the annual Vermonter Poll. The survey was conducted between the hours of 4:00 p.m. and 9:00 p.m. beginning on February 6, 2006 and ending on February 10, 2006. The telephone polling was conducted from the University of Vermont using computer-aided telephone interviewing (CATI). The sample for the poll was drawn through random digit dialing and used all of the telephone exchanges in the state of Vermont as the sampling frame. Only Vermont residents over the age of eighteen were interviewed. The poll included questions on a variety of issues related to public policy in the state of Vermont. There were 726 respondents to the 2006 Vermonter Poll (Version I). The results based on a group of this size have a margin of error of plus or minus 4 percent at a confidence interval of 95 percent.
